His career flourished early, headlining some clubs before he was legal at the door. VIDEO GAMES AND MUSIC

I'm Connor. I'm a college student. I have almost no money, one console (a Wii) and a subpar computer to game with. But I am still a gamer, and I will have my gaming! I am also a musician, so I am attracted to games with good music. Recently I've come across a few inexpensive games on Steam (a digital distribution service for games) that have pretty awesome music to go with great game-play. The only thing that sometimes suffers is the graphics, but when you're on a tight budget, gameplay and music are the deciding force.

The first game I would like to highlight, Terraria, was released in May 2010. It's not exactly new, but the way the developers constantly update it, it feels new every few months. Graphically, it looks like a 16-bit era side-scroller. The sprites themselves look like the battle sprites from Final Fantasy II and III for the good old Super NES.

Nostalgia aside, the soundtrack is quite outstanding. It combines synthetic "bleeps and bloops" with a more modern orchestra sound, and for each of the "biomes" there is a unique theme. For instance, in this game you can dig yourself a hole down to "hell", and as you dig deeper the music gets more mysterious. Soon you're running for your less-than-well-geared digital life, fleeing from demons who want nothing more than to see you burn in the oceans of lava while the creepiest orchestra you've ever heard plays.

You can also get some friends involved by running your own server, which extends play time and makes raiding the dungeon a lot more fun! Best part: it's \$9.99 on Steam. Though, you have to find a wrapper-program to play it on Mac, sorry Mac-users!

Spiral Knights was released around the same time as Terraria and is equally addicting, free-to-play (no subscription fees here!) and Mac-friendly.

This game is even more retro in some respects than Terraria. It offers a Massively Multiplayer Online RPG (MMORPG) format with "hack-'n'-slash" gameplay. Those familiar with the Legend of Zelda or Gauntlet series can draw comparisons.

The soundtrack is a lot more nostalgic than Terraria in the way it makes you feel, as it doesn't have the quirkiness that Terraria's offers. It's basically an old console-era soundtrack with added realistic orchestration that just hooks onto your brain and refuses to leave, and also makes the boss battles amazingly epic.

The GUI (graphical user interface) is isometric 3D, so you need a bit of a better computer to run it, but if you have a computer that's less than two years old (even with stock graphics cards) then you should be able to play it just fine.

One thing you must be aware about Spiral Knights if you choose to play is that the world changes in real time, and every 24 hours you get 100 Mist Energy, which is required to do a lot of things in the world. This restricts your playtime unless you are willing to pay for it, which is good and bad. I like this aspect because I sometimes lose myself in games with a social aspect like Spiral Knights, so the restricted game play per day is quite welcome!

That's all from me for this month, even if you don't get to play either of these games, do some You-Tube searching for their soundtracks to listen to you just may find yourself drawn in.
