LITR 408 - Chaucer: In this

course we will analyze some of Chaucer's major works, his place in English literary history, and examine various critical approaches to Chaucer. Students will also learn about the Medieval world: love, food, romance, religion, and science and study Chaucer's cultural medieval settings. Students will read some works in Middle English and learn pronunciation.
